First N.Y. Annual T & T Show

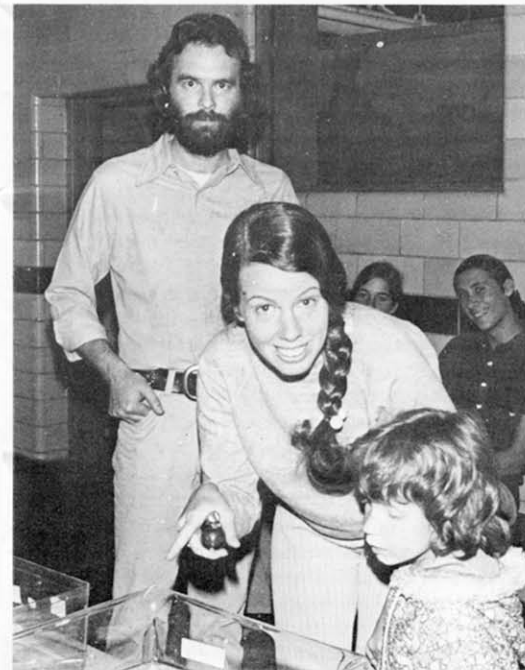
“The weather was mild and the turtles and tortoises came . . .” reports member Martha Reeves. Also present were over two hundred spectators, many of whom were seeing their very first *Platemys platycephala* or *Chelus fimbriata*. Founded just one year ago, NYT&TS celebrated its year of existence by putting on its first annual show.

Among the more spectacular specimens in the entry field of over a hundred were an albino *Pseudemys scripta elegans* and a gigantic *Geochelone pardalis babcocki*. The New York Turtle & Tortoise Society is building a reputation for especially active participation on behalf of conservation and preservation interests. For this reason, they showed no species protected by State of New York or the federal government.

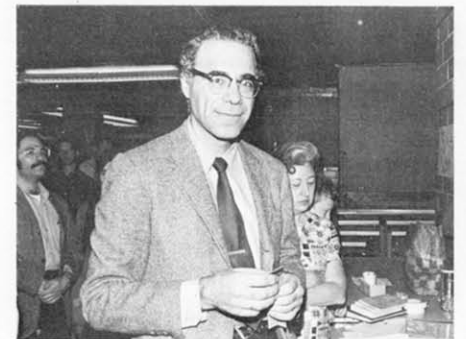
Pleased winners accepted ribbons and certificates in each division, and a large silver-plated engraved turtle was presented for Best in Show, which was an *Emys orbicularis*.
